
My Dear Sister May 16th 1820

On 11 May 1813 Blaxland, Lawson and Wentworth set out from South Creek acco Friday 10 May 2013, 10am - 3.30 WHEN by four servants, five dogs and four horses. They walked for 17 days through the bush, marking the bark of the trees to trace their steps. We often say that the records can vary in size and contents and this is surely true of the Intestate files. The Intestate papers relate to individuals who didn't leave a Will, they cover the time period 1821-1913. The files can contain a couple of pages and sometimes they can be over one hundred and it is only by coming into the reading room and requesting the record that this can be established. Recently one of our regular researchers, Margaret Jones, came across a real find in the Intestate series. The file is for a William Satterwaite (a well known forger) dating 1837 [6/3488] no. 171. Along with the information relating to the estate, Margaret also located personal correspondence between William and his wife, as well as many other items of interest. One letter in the file was to William Satterwaite's wife Mary from her sister Frances. Mary was awaiting transportation to Australia on a Hulk ship when Frances wrote the letter. Dated 16 May 1820 it is a very touching letter and provides a rare glimpse into the lives of the two sisters.



Now can I express the sorrow which I feel in reading your letter which informs me that perhaps I may never see you Oh Mary to part without seeing you, you that I so dearly love, before you go, I hope my dear sister that this may be your most, your last trouble, for indeed you have had many and seveare (sic) troubles. I am happy to hear you say that you do not regret leaving your country or may the Almighty grant that you ma (sic) be more fortunate than you was in this land.My Dear Sister do not for a moment suppose that I could ever forget you. Oh no my sister never tho' we should never meet more yet you will be forever dead and remmembered (sic) by me. I am extremely happy to hear that you have prayers



Flickr update The latest additions include:

document a death duty applied on the estates of deceased NSW tax payers between 1880 and 1958. Under the Stamp Duties Act of 1880 and 1920, no probates or letters of administration could be granted until the death duty was paid. Exemptions where made if you earned under a certain amount and under the 1920 Act, widows and children under the age of 21 only had to pay half of the duty in estates under £5000. Deceased Estate files can be valuable for the family historian who wants to recreate the lifestyle of an individual by viewing detailed lists of their possessions. Jewellery and heirlooms may be itemised providing insight into the values and properties of the deceased. Land owned by the deceased may be listed including references to land title records and even conditional purchases. The information gained may open up further avenues of research, such as conditional purchase records as well as rate and valuation records, to name a few. Stock on a farming property may be fully listed giving insight into the earning potential of the land and its productivity. A building may be formally valued and a description of the building supplied in the file. It is important to note that the information provided in a Deceased Estate file will vary in each case as one file may be a list of shares and the next a long list of valuations of family heirlooms. When looking for a deceased estate file it is important to remember that the records are organised by the date of administration of the tax. It could take several months after death to administer the estate and therefore the date could fall in the following year to the death. It is also possible your family member was exempted from the tax and won't have a deceased estate file at all. Exemptions could be granted and, if duty was charged, the amount would vary according to the assets involved and the relationship between the deceased and the persons entitled to the estate. Some examples of notable deceased estate files include: Rudyard Kipling as he owned assets in NSW, Charles Kingsford Smith and Dame Nellie Melba. If someone had a deceased estate file they would most likely also have a Probate file. Tip: the probate number is often listed on the back of a deceased estate file - this tip is handy when the probate index is difficult to read. Deceased Estate files are a useful avenue for the family historian who wants to know more about their ancestors by looking at their possessions.
